

The 3-12-08 Board of Directors Meeting was called to order by President Ben Douglas at 6:35 p.m. Directors present were Ben Douglas, Al Sindlinger, Chris Grothe, Chuck Smith, Wes Butler, J.C. Charles, Howard Atamian, Richard Pierce, Ken Kenoyer, Dave Summers, Tony Wortner, and David Dunlap.

Secretary's Report: Ben Douglas moved to accept the minutes of the 1-8-08 board meeting and it was seconded by Al Sindlinger. The motion passed.

Ken also discussed Non-Profit Status for the club which carries the advantage of having 501c(3) status which will allow contributions to our club to be tax deductible to the contributor. There is a process to achieve and maintain this status which will require the service of a CPA and the subsequent annual filing of a tax return for the club. Ben, Ken and Richard were all going to visit with their accountants as to the complete process and cost of such an undertaking.

Ken updated the group on the Hand Plane Class scheduled for Saturday, April 12. There were presently 3 students signed up but a minimum of 7 are needed to break even. The class registration includes materials to make a plane. Three extra material sets will be ordered. Two of the extras will be given to the instructors as compensation and the third set will either be used for any late sign-ups or purchased by Ken.

The March meeting was all set to go at Wes Hofer's shop and Al was to contact Wes to see if any final issues may be outstanding.

The April meeting will be held in Kingsburg and will feature the Annual Meeting and project contest. Ben is working on gathering prizes. Setup help will be needed on Friday before the event.

Ben Douglas informed the group that new member Ron Zanini who is a retired instructor was interested in presenting a program on Marquetry for the May meeting in Kingsburg.

The May meeting will be held in Kingsburg during the Swedish Festival. The festival coordinators are Gary Nelson and Ron Bergman. Dave Summers is to contact both of these people to coordinate all information to our club about our meeting and participation in the Swedish Festival. They would like for us to be in the parade and to have some of our

members sell items as well. Bruce Auernheimer agreed to contact someone he knows that owns a Model-T to see if he would be interested in being in the parade. J.C. and Al both said they would be interested in selling some of their crafts and Tony was going to ask Bob Sansom if he might like to be a vendor as well.

Richard Pierce briefed us on the Website. He would be happy to publish items to the site such as your projects, news, pictures or want ads. Just send it to him electronically with the appropriate explanation or caption.

Dave Summers reported that the South toy group may get started in July.

Ben Douglas reported on the clubs video equipment which was recently purchased for a total cost of \$1,520.00. The equipment consists of a projector, screen, two stands, two cameras, a camera switcher and a table. Chris Grothe will be the custodian of this equipment and thus responsible for having it available and operating at the meetings where it may be required.

term of office. David provided opening remarks which were well received by the members. We look for David to lead this club to the next level. Ron is immediately getting involved agreeing to conduct a workshop on marquetry at a future meeting. Several members offered show-and-tell items which were very interesting. J.C's lidded oriental boxes were amazing! We then moved to the dovetail workshops which was very informative and interesting. First presenter on the Keller jig was Jerry Ellis. Jerry created a through dovetail joint for the members in a very effortless manner, despite his statement that this was only the second time he has used the Jig. It just cannot be as easy as he made it look, can it? Jerry offered numerous tips on setting up the Jig and also demonstrated his method of aligning the workpiece to the fingers on the Jig. The jig as demonstrated was very user friendly. Nice job Jerry. Next up was Dave Kibler who presented on the 24" Leigh Jig. Dave did not demonstrate the use of the jig but rather gave a very informative and complete verbal presentation of this product. I found his presentation to be very complete and helpful for those looking to purchase a dove tail Jig. Dave related the

Leigh Jig provides the flexibility of spacing of the fingers for a "hand sawn" look. However the Jig requires more steps to set up correctly than does the Keller Jig. Essentially he related there is a cost to that flexibility in set up time. However, the manual provided is comprehensive and very well written and essential to the user to read and understand before starting to use the Jig. Dave related well to us to not be intimidated by the reputation of this jig as "difficult" or "complicated". Take your time, read the manual, practice and you will be successful with the Leigh Jig. Nice job Dave. Last to present was Ben Douglas on the Rockler Dovetail Jig and he also did a great job. Ben was unflappable as he walked us through the task of creating half blind dovetails on this jig. Ben was clear, concise and straight forward when sharing about each step in the process; what does not work as advertised, what does and the steps necessary to overcome obstacles to achieve the desired result. Critical information was provided by all three presenters to assist members in better understanding these dovetail Jigs. Once again thanks to all.


The museum (Clay school) and the Park are on the left (North).


"Dave talks about the Leigh Jig"


